Maintenance Safety Tips: Kitchen Safety-Grease Fires



Grease fires are one of the leading causes of kitchen accidents. They can spread quickly and become very dangerous. Here are some key safety tips: Never use water to put out a grease fire-it makes the flames spread. Turn off the heat source immediately, if safe to do so. Cover the flames with a metal lid or baking sheet to smother the fire. Use backing soda or a Class K fire extinguisher, if needed. Call 911 if the fire cannot be controlled. Remember: Stay calm, act fast,

and never put yourself in danger. Proper Disposal of Cooking Grease Pouring cooking grease down the sink or toilet can cause severe plumbing issues, clogs, and even attract pests. Please follow these steps: Let grease cool and solidify. Scrape it into a sealed container (a disposable can/jar). Throw it in the trash-never down

the drain or THE BACK DOOR. Wipe pans with a paper towel before washing to avoid buildup in pipes. Keeping grease out of the drains helps prevent costly repairs and plumbing emergencies. Rodents such as mice, rats, and roaches are attracted to food, water, and shelter. Common causes include: Improper food storage (open containers,

crumbs left out). Grease of food residue in sinks, stoves, & trash areas Unsealed garbage bags or overflowing bins, and Clutter that provides nesting spots. Prevention Tips: Store food in sealed containers; Take trash out regularly and keep lids closed; Clean up crumbs, grease, and spills promptly. Report any signs of rodents to Maintenance immediately.

PAYING RENT ON TIME IS VITAL TO LEASE COMPLIANCE

**AS STATED IN YOUR LEASE:
RENT IS DUE ON THE 1ST OF EACH MONTH
DURING NORMAL WORKING HOURS.**

Rent is considered late or past due, if full monthly payment, partial payments due or any amount in the arrears from previous months is not paid by the fifth (5) of the current month.

If the fifth (5) falls on a Holiday or Weekend, then is due on the next working day and is past due after that date.

A drop box is available at each site location for your convenience.

Rent(s) placed in drop box on the fifth after 4:00 p.m. are considered late.

Per lease in Section XI: D. (2) "Repeated late payment, which shall be defined as failure to pay the amount of rent or



other charges due by the 5th of the month.



Four (4) such late payments within a 12-month period shall constitute as being chronically delinquent

and a termination notice will be issued.

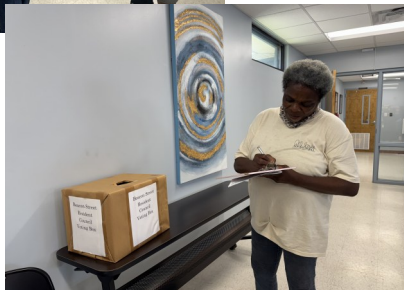

provide children, youth, and families with opportunities to explore new stories, strengthen literacy skills, and enjoy the simple joy of reading together.



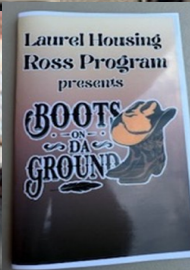

Saving Strategies

1. Created Budget Plan
 - Before I began to allocate my funds, I had to find a budget plan that would benefit me. My biggest deciding factor was being able to contribute to my needs and savings.
2. Future Finance Planning
 - After I handled my necessities, I decided that there was room for saving and investment. I found that the 529 plan sparked my interest. This could be used for future children.
 - ***A 529 plan** is a tax-free savings account for education expenses like K-12 tuition, vocational school, and college. This includes student loans, and any supplies needed. Withdrawals for education are penalty-free, but non-education uses are taxed and penalized.*

50% Income- \$8,890.50

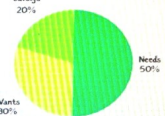
- This portion of my income will cover my needs and any priority bills and necessary expenses. Examples are rent, food, and reliable transportation.

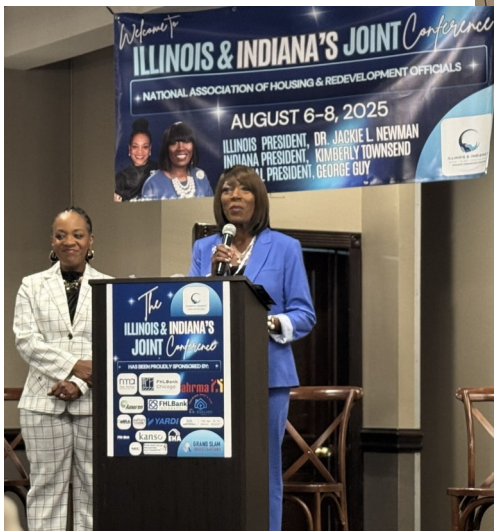

The Laurel Housing Authority (LHA) continues to strive to provide affordable housing opportunities for residents of Laurel and Jones County. LHA Executive Director Ailrick Young and the Board of Commissioners recently announced ongoing improvements to the agency's properties and plans to add 200 new housing units within the next three years. The agency also recognized one of its long-serving board members, Rev. George L. Barnes, with the naming of the LHA Board Room in his honor. On August 14, 2025, the Board of Commissioners held its annual meeting and program, which included recognizing residents and employees for their service.
